<b>Session title</b>	<b>Parallel session #2: Accelerating the implementation of high-impact practices in CIPs</b>	<b>Room name</b>	Ballroom 1
<b>Session length</b>	1 hr, 45 min (December 13, 11:00 a.m. – 12:45 p.m.)		
<b>Background and Rationale</b>	<p>Through recommendations made by ministers of health, the 2016-2020 acceleration phase of the Ouagadougou Partnership encourages countries to adopt and scale up high-impact approaches that could enable these countries to reach the goal of an additional 2.2 million women.</p> <p>There is a group of experts established at the global level, supported by USAID, that are working continuously to evaluate the approaches to certify and popularize them as high-impact practices.</p> <p>As task sharing is recognized as one of the high-impact practices, in September 2016 the OP organized a regional consultation on task sharing with the participation of all ECOWAS countries. After this consultation, the countries identified catalyst task sharing activities to be implemented, which are currently supported by the WHO. Specific recommendations were also created for the development of a regional task sharing resolution. This regional resolution was submitted by WAHO and approved by ministers of health in June 2017.</p> <p>However, a major challenge for OP countries remains: transitioning from these multiple pilot phases to scaled high-impact practices. Several of these countries are in the revision and/or renewal process of their CIPs. As the CIPs act to mobilize resources and help to align partners, CIPs should include the high-impact practices prioritized by each country.</p> <p>This session will allow the countries and partners to speak and discuss the level of appropriation and implementation of their catalyst task sharing activities. It will also provide an opportunity to discuss the importance of OP countries accelerating the implementation of their CIP in order to achieve the 2020 objective. This session will also be an opportunity for partners to exchange with countries about the best way to support them in practical operationalization of the ECOWAS ministers of health regional task sharing resolution.</p>		
<b>Expected results</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Discuss catalyst task-sharing activities and investment opportunities in CIPs to support the countries in reaching their goals.</li> <li>- Understand how investment opportunities in CIPs were determined and how to use them, especially in facilitating partner alignment.</li> <li>- Share some of the countries' experiences regarding task sharing</li> <li>- Discuss practical operationalization of the ECOWAS ministers of health regional task sharing resolution.</li> </ul>
